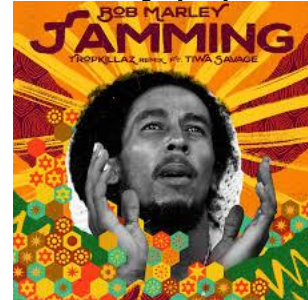


Song of the Week :

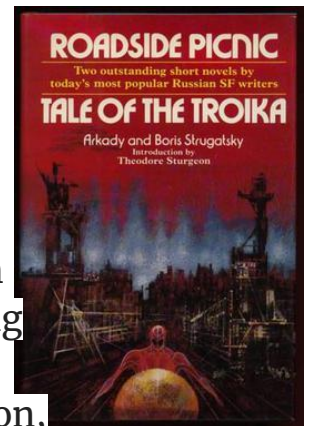
Book of the Week

Road Side Picnic Tale of Torika By Boris and Arkady Strugatsky

"Roadside Picnic" by Arkady and Boris Strugatsky, translated by Antonina W. Bouis, is a captivating science fiction novel that delves into the aftermath of an extraterrestrial event. The story unfolds in the wake of an alien visitation, which leaves behind mysterious and hazardous Zones filled with strange and inexplicable phenomena. The narrative follows Redrick "Red" Schuhart, a "stalker" who illegally ventures into the Zone to retrieve valuable alien artifacts.

Breed: German shepherd

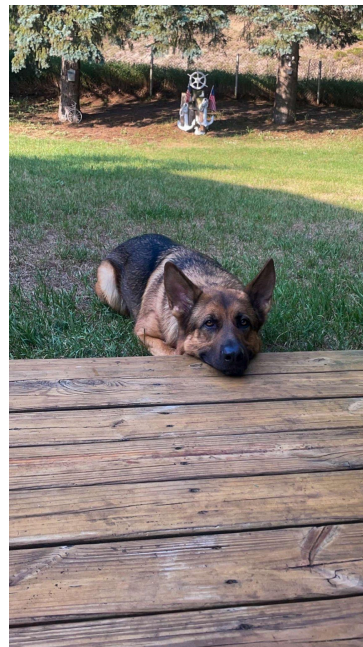

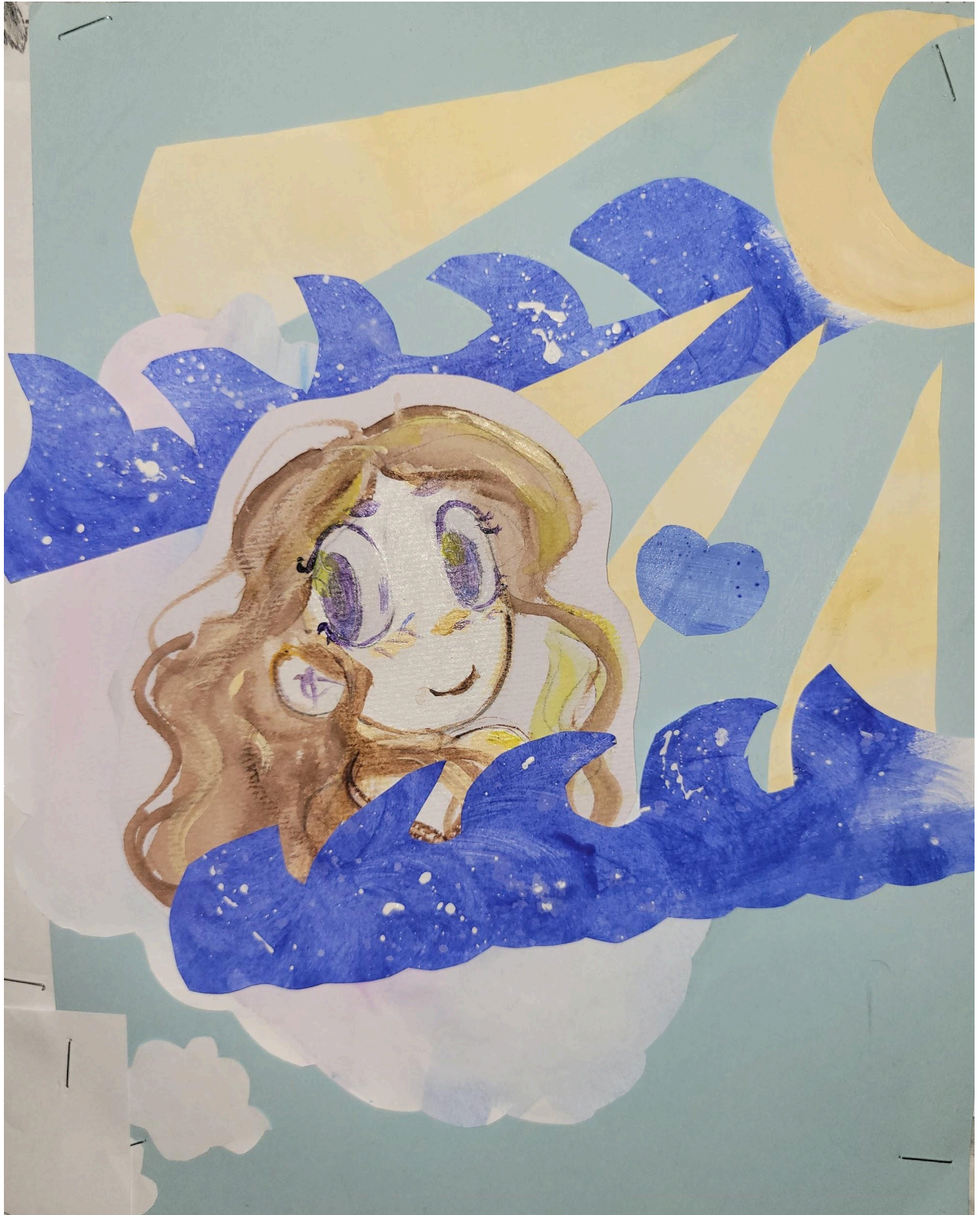
Favorite things to do: Quinn loves to go
